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Walking Through Open Doors in Tanzania

I'm excited to share with you what is going on about a door that God seems to be presenting to our ministry!

Hopefully you are aware of the transformation that has taken place in education over the past years in Karansi--changing it from a place of little hope to one of great promise for the future. Over these years of progress, though, there has been struggle, and the change has not always come easily. One of our biggest challenges has been the government regulations of the curriculum. These regulations impacted everything within the school from content to class schedule to culture, and our teacher teams have done well to expand the curriculum while not running afoul of local inspectors. Overall, the progress made in education has happened despite these regulations and the cultural impact they have. Sometimes it's felt like we've been swimming a bit against the current all these years.

But God has orchestrated an amazing work!

As the SHEFO and UBORA teams attempted to try to get local education authorities to relax these regulations, God had much bigger plans.

He placed the idea in Pastor Wariaeli's mind to arrange a meeting with the Minister of Education in the capital of Dodoma - an unprecedented request for a small village like Karansi. At just the right time, God had the Prime Minister initiate discussions within Parliament about the need for major education reform, so Pastor's idea was well received – and therefore a meeting was agreed. He then provided the resources and timing so that the Siha District leadership could attend.

And so, on June 3rd, SHEFO leadership, eight members of the Siha District leadership team, Jerry Thames and I made a trip to the Tanzanian Parliament to meet with the Deputy Minister of Education, Mr. Omary Kipanga and his team.

The Holy Spirit was present and provided the right words as we presented a brief history of the school, our curriculum, teaching methodologies, an update on the school expansion, and plans for the future of Tanzanian education.



The meeting could not have gone better. In short, the Ministry of Education has expressed its desire for Siha Leadership School to be a Reference School for future education reform! We now have the freedom, privilege, and responsibility to take education to the next level and continue creating the best education system for the children of Tanzania.

This is a major answer to many prayers over many years for our school. The situation was presented to the Ubora Board of Directors, and it was agreed that we should move forward boldly, but humbly, and with much prayer - in viewing this as a Godgiven opportunity to impact the education system of the nation of Tanzania. We have been blessed with different experiences and resources here, and we pray that we will steward these well going forward and blend them gracefully with those of our Tanzanian brothers and sisters – all for the glory of Jesus.

We all know that there will be new challenges to face, but in the coming years, this is going to be a healthy dose of, well, FUN! We envision things like...

- The Curiosity Zone a hands-on learning lab for grades K-3
- Full science labs for the upper grades
 - Additional hands-on and engaging resources in

the classrooms

- Expanded teacher mentoring
- More opportunities to read to children, and
- Mind expanding activities for after school and on weekends

As I think about how much potential these kids have, I distinctly recall on an early VBS trip introducing one or two children to a simple game of thumb-wrestling and was soon mobbed by 30 kids. If this simple game brought so much joy, I cannot imagine the excitement and learning that will happen with the type of programs we are envisioning.

It is going to be a hoot, and we will need folks to go and be a part of this in the coming months and years.

Could God be opening the door for you to be involved on helping transform education in Tanzania? Let's talk.

An Invitation to Impact a Nation Through Education

The doors that God continues to open for our work in Tanzania are both humbling and awe-inspiring. We are excited to share more about the beautiful doors of our Education Impact Program, now swinging wide open, leading toward education reform and transformation for the entire country and people of Tanzania.

The vision was cast by Pastor Wariaeli Maphie almost 20 years ago, spoken in prayer, when he proclaimed, "The future leaders of Tanzania will one day rise up from the village of Karansi, from the poorest of the poor." This unlikely pathway would be forged through education, specifically the establishment of a private Christian English medium school dedicated to excellence that would one day become Siha Leadership Pre and Primary School.

The success of Siha Leadership School has recently gained attention from national leaders in Tanzania. Teams from Ubora and SHEFO (our in-country partner) were invited to attend a session at the Parliament of Tanzania in June of this year and meet with top-level government officials seeking to reform government public schools in their country.

Public Education in Tanzania

As recently as 2005, more than 30% of Tanzanian school age children did not attend school at all. By 2013, attendance in public schools had increased but the quality of education received was sorely lacking. Teachers were given a very narrow and shallow curriculum and coached to "teach to the test" – specifically the national exams given in grades four and seven. This approach produced students who could "guess well" and figure out a test response but did not have an academic skill set based on actual learning.

"Our education system produces graduates who can pass the test but not do anything useful," said Kassim Majaliwa, the Prime Minister of Tanzania, in a May 2021 address to Parliament.



The Siha Leadership Formula

Founded in 2005, Siha Leadership is a private Christian English medium school. Children at our school enjoy a custom curriculum adapted specifically for the Tanzanian student, with handson learning opportunities, modern facilities and adequate teacher and student supplies, low teacher-studio ratios, and a nurturing environment with Christ at the center. A school envisioned for "the poorest of the poor," SLS is funded through sponsorships and the Ubora Project Child Impact Program.

One of the many challenges we've faced along the way has been learning how to teach children in a non-literate, subsistence-based society.

Many adults in Tanzania, especially those in rural areas like Karansi, are unable to read or write. And for parents dealing with mere survival, their children often do not get the adequate stimulation during the critical early development years from birth to five years of age. In many places children have the benefit of mobiles, early childhood toys, books being read to them, constant interaction from parents and loved ones—all of which stimulate developing brain synapses that are so important for learning later in life. These types of activities generally do not happen where parents don't read, do not have resources, and are most concerned with the all-consuming responsibilities of daily survival. These dynamics still exist today in much of Tanzania, though progress is being made.

The road to excellence in education at SLS has been paved in incremental steps, with help from God above, and through Ubora donors, sponsors and volunteers. A number of teachers from Perimeter School in metro Atlanta have been invaluable in refining the school, leading seminars and investing heart, time, money and expertise in shaping the curriculum and mentoring their teacher counterparts in Karansi. Some have even moved to Tanzania for extended periods of time! These seminars have been well-received with cont.



many concepts implemented and integrated into the standard Tanzanian curriculum.

Wendy Williams, who leads our Education Impact Program, has lent heart, soul and her expertise in education in rewriting the curriculum. Her contributions have truly made a significant difference in laying the groundwork for education reform in Tanzania. Miriam Johnson and David & Mary Ann Taylor have invested years of their lives living in Tanzania, deepening relationships and mentoring both teachers and staff in transformative ways.

Our model is unique and effective and our graduates are well on their way to becoming the future leaders of Tanzania, including six students who are currently in medical school! In recent years, we have been developing a holistic approach to education, developing curriculum from preschool up that is providing a foundation base of knowledge that is not just "better" it's transformative! Student scores are improving dramatically, moving Siha Leadership into the top 10 percent of all Schools in Tanzania. Even more significantly, students understand the material and are enthusiastic participants fully engaged in the process of learning.

Exciting developments are on the horizon for Siha Leadership, including the opening of the first class of the second stream in 2022 for boarding students, and prayers and planning for one of the first STEM secondary schools in rural Tanzania.

God's plan for Tanzania...continuing to unfold.

The Next Open Door

Siha Leadership School teachers, U.S. mentorteachers, and the Ubora/SHEFO staff aim to address existing concerns for government schools and become a touchstone of educational transformation for public schools in Tanzania. This goal is massive and slightly intimidating, but has the potential to dramatically improve the country. We are ready for the challenge.

With the recent meeting in Dodoma, SLS and its mentors stand on the shore of a huge sea change. With the newly conferred status of Reference School by the government, SLS can now embrace broader curriculum reforms incorporating unique Charlotte Mason-style philosophy with a STEMprep twist. These academic upgrades will lean heavily on developing strong foundations, learning for understanding, critical thinking, problem solving, encouraging inventive ideas, expanding knowledge of and appreciation for literature, fine art, and the natural world, and a joy in learning.

As Ubora, SHEFO, and SLS embark on this great adventure to impact a nation we need YOU! Is God calling you to walk through these doors with us?

Metamorphosis of a Sponsored Child Godfrey Samwel Laizer

Joy Sasser and her family have sponsored Godfrey Samwel Laizer since he was 4 years old and in pre-school. She and her family have visited Godfrey in Tanzania and held numerous video calls. Following are impressions from her most recent family visit.

"Metamorphosis is the process of transformation from an immature form to an adult. We watch this happen with our own children and it is amazing, but it has been a unique delight to watch it in Godfrey.

We first began sponsoring Godfrey when he was 4. He was so cute! Fourteen years later, he is now 18, a graduate of secondary school and a recent graduate of a Discipleship Training School (DTS) through Youth with a Mission (YWAM). We are so proud of him! Coming from humble beginnings, he has excelled both academically and spiritually. The recipient of an Ubora/Project Child scholarship, he will soon enter advance secondary to study biology, chemistry and physics. He has never wavered from his pursuit as a young man to work in the medical field.

Looking back, I can see the evolution of his letters to us that began with the teacher doing the writing and filling in Godfrey's answer, to Godfrey copying sentences from the classroom blackboard and filling in his own answers, to our first video call. He was so sweet, but he also needed an interpreter to help give him the right English words. Over the years, letters became more in-depth and personal, revealing to us who he was becoming. Our visit to Karansi and to his secondary school built on our relationship, as did Zoom calls that needed almost no outside help. Our most recent 30-minute call included a fully fluid English conversation where he articulately told of all that God was doing in his heart while on his DTS and the opportunities he has had to preach the gospel. He told of how he was learning about the character of God and the love of God and how he had learned to share this in churches during their outreach. Godfrey was also learning how to think about and plan for his future. It was fun to identify with his experience, as I did a DTS with YWAM when I was just out of college. He asked when this was and was shocked when I said 1996! When he asked what I had learned on my DTS I got to share a similar story about grasping and sharing the message of God's love--not just as a class but as a future lifestyle. Godfrey is on the same journey.

Godfrey always maintained a smile and repeatedly expressed his joy and gratitude for the years of sponsorship, encouragement, and relationship. He passed on greetings and gratitude from his mom and he asked about our 4 kids by name (none were home for the call). Our son Henry is just weeks older than Godfrey so it has been special to see them hit similar milestones at the same time.

His heart just seemed to overflow, making my heart overflow with joy, thankfulness, and hope for his future wherever God may take him. What a privilege it has been to come alongside this child as he has become a man of God eager to grow and learn and serve others. God has done a good thing!

Is your sponsored child young and you don't really see a whole lot of connection at this point? Keep writing, keep sending gifts, keep sponsoring, keep doing Zoom calls, keep praying, and keep encouraging. Transformation takes time and it is a beautiful reward for those who are persistent and patient."















The ministry of Ubora is largely dependent upon volunteers responding to the small, but sometimes loud voice of God calling us as His children to serve our brothers and sisters in Tanzania.

Volunteers have been the heart of this ministry. One such volunteer is Pam Willis, serving on the Ubora Project Child team. Six years ago Wendy Williams invited Pam to help with organizing, cataloging and distributing packages and letters on their way to Karansi. Pam had taken part in the distribution of gifts while in Karansi on one of her visits and said, "I saw the impact our gifts and letters had on our children and their families. The joy the children expressed at being cared for by someone outside of their village was indescribable! I felt the Lord was calling me to help facilitate that in some way." So, Pam pitched in, eventually taking the lead. You can imagine, facilitating letters and packages between sponsors and 400+ students is guite a task, a role that she now shares with Michele Lockwood, another volunteer. Michele now manages the gift packages while Pam focuses on emails via projectchildletter@uboratz.org both serving to facilitate relations into another culture on the other side of the globe.

Bobby Scott, Celebrated Christian Educator, Joins Ubora Board of Directors

Read on to learn more about Bobby Scott and his Ubora story, in his words...

"My daughter, Jessica, is passionate about reaching out to serve the least and the lost. In 2001, when she was 16, she challenged me to go on a mission trip with her to Tanzania.

At that time, I was Headmaster of Perimeter School, so my role on the team was to lead men's discipleship seminars and meet our partners there. Many of these people I still know today.

Two years later, in 2003, was when God lit a fire within me for Tanzania and I took a trip to learn more about the school in Karansi. I thought, "This is something Perimeter School can do. Something the teachers can do. Something beyond a mission trip."

The teachers at that time in Tanzania had very little training. Godfrey, the headmaster of Siha Leadership School at the time, and I became great friends. He's like a son and even calls me "Baba" (father in Swahili). He has always been so helpful and guided us well as we have discussed various education-related ideas through his cultural filter.

Teacher trips soon followed, with the Perimeter School teachers leading seminars. Soon these teachers were involved in leading all aspects of these trips. Amazing miracles have occurred as a result of those trips.

We could see every time we went a growing vitality, a renewed interest in the students, and an enthusiasm in the teachers themselves. The teachers saw the progression of the kids and how the resources we were teaching them were helpful and effective. There was an increase in education every year we went--in the kids and their physical and mental well-being.

It's just incredible to see where we are now.

We have seen God take those first efforts and expand them to provide for the needs of the whole child; to be more than just vacationers going over there to help them. We had to build relationships with the people there first to let them know that we loved and cared for them.

It took time. But finally, we were able to ask, "Are you open to ideas?"

Now, there is major breakthrough and some recognition at the highest level of Tanzania government, specifically the Ministry of Education, regarding our teaching methodology. Could these be the foundational ways in which children can move to greater heights, into changing the nation overall for the good?

That whole event happened as a result of relationships and God, in His own timing—He has brought that about.

It has taken 20 years of prayer, testing the waters--doing things right, doing things wrong. God has been good and gracious. The Holy Spirit has moved us step by step to reach this height.

Where exactly do we go from here? It's a mystery, but God knows!

If we choose a process that sucks the wonder out of it, we are not following God's plan. We are going to move forward in the best way we know how, and see what God puts into place.

Overall, our success rests on the relationships we've built. God has used this as a foundation to be able to do what we are doing now.

Impact Program Updates

Food Silos and Medical Containers Bring Hope, Healing, and Happy Tummies!

Shortly after you went to sleep last night, more than 3,200 school age children in rural Tanzania woke up to the crowing of roosters and the African sun streaming in through the cracks in the walls of their smoky bomas and met the day with hope. They were headed to school where they would be fed breakfast and lunch – what a miracle!

It wasn't too long ago students in the same schools would arrive to school hungry—many having received no breakfast at home or lunch at school. Can you imagine trying to function and learn when your body is literally starving?

Thanks to the efforts and generosity of Griffin and Valerie Stewart of 5DayDeal, five grain silos have been placed around the Siha District at the neediest schools. These nutritionally enriched meals are mitigating the effect of years of lack for these students.

In 2004, Kilemi Mwiria, then the Assistant Minister



for Education and MP for Tigania West, Kenya wrote in an article: "If we agree that one has to be physically fit to engage in any productive work, then it is easy to appreciate why children need to be well fed not only to grow but also to concentrate on learning while at school."

"Because the poor may not view educating their children as a priority in the context of more pressing problems, many of their children are not only under-fed (and on an imbalanced diet) before attending school but are also made to take part in family labor [animal care, farming, wood gathering, etc.] Thus, investment in education that is not accompanied by investment in the health and nutrition of school goers is a net loss for the country, if those invested in are unable to learn effectively or drop out of school due to illness."

We are seeing significant change in the schools where silos have been placed which supports Mr. Mwiria's views. In June we received one of our first official reports sharing how access to nutritionally fortified meals has positively impacted the students.



Impact of Silos

- A noticeable decrease in students fainting from hunger during afternoon assembly was reported at Karansi Primary School
- A 9% increase in attendance at Kandashi Primary School was reported. That means 47 additional students are now attending school...praises!
- A decrease in the number of students falling asleep in class due to hunger was reported by all schools.

15 more silos are in process or planned for the future, so join us in praising God for the Stewarts, 5DayDeal, and all those on both sides of the ocean who have made these silos a reality! Pray for the children as they experience the positive physical and academic effects of better nutrition and for those who were behind in their schooling to catch up.

A huge, "Asante sana!" to all of our partners, donors, and prayer warriors! YOU are the reason that we can accomplish the goals that God places before us. We know that He is in control of all things but He is using each of you in mighty ways to advance the Kingdom and to bring renewal, hope, and healing to the people of the Siha district of

Medical Campaign Update

Not only are the food silos providing a clear and immediate change in the Siha District, the medicine and medical equipment the Ubora family provided are saving lives.

Last year, you gave sacrificially to Ubora so that we could send two shipping containers of medicine, supplies, and biomedical equipment to the Siha District Hospital. As you can imagine, shipping 20 foot and 40 foot containers from Brunswick, GA to Dar es Salaam, Tanzania is a logistics ballet of the greatest proportions! And we did it during a pandemic! But God is faithful and the containers arrived in December 2020 and January 2021 at the hospital.

Recently, Dr. Peter Mahu, new District Medical Officer in Siha, shared how the contents of the containers are being used:

- 729 patients have received free diabetes medicine since January
- 5,875 women have received prenatal vitamins since January
- Maternal deaths have decreased from 177.3/100,000 (Jan-June 2020) to 71.2/100,000 (Jan-June 2021) due to the prenatal vitamins. It was reported that many of the deaths had been due to severe anemia in the mother.
- Infant mortality has decreased from 3.6/1000 (Jan-June 2020) to 2.4/1000 (Jan-June 2021) and is attributed to availability of children's vitamins and antibiotics.
- Number of patients seeking medical services has increased as word spread of the arrival of meds and equipment. In all of 2020, 6094 people were treated as outpatients. So far in 2021, Jan-May, 9904 people have been seen by the outpatient department.
- Rombo, Same, and Hai district hospitals, and Bugando and Mbeya zonal referral hospitals have also benefited because Siha was able to share medicines with these facilities.
- There has been a decrease in patients with severe complications from hypertension, epilepsy, and diabetes. Prior to shipment these patients could not afford their medications and would end up at the hospital with severe issues or would die at home from complications. Now, they receive their meds free of charge and their prognosis is good.
- The cardiac monitor in the operating room has allowed Siha medical personnel to monitor patients during operations whereas before they had to refer cases to other facilities or, even worse, the attending physicians would not know that a patient on the table was experiencing cardiac distress.

"We feel a big debt in our hearts to...those who paid for this equipment...Many health care workers when they are in school only read about equipment like this but have never used them.
